Help to adjust and correct our thinking. Cognitive tools that remove our constraints and help us to get the most of the information we collect.

1 While many things change, most things remain constant.

Whatever information is assailing you, distinguish between real and apparent change, basic shifts and fads, remembering that in the history of the world, most things remain contstant.

Differentiate between: basics and embellishment rules and techniques trends and fads breakthroughs and refinements.

2 The future is embedded in the present.

The directions and turns the world will take are embedded in the past and in the present. We often recognize them retrospectively, but our purpose is to anticipate what lies ahead. Newspapers help us do that successfully. They are not only the first draft of history but the first to give us a glimpse of the future.

3 Focus on the score of the game.

Focus on the score of the game you are dealing with, compared with the box scores in baseball and basketball. Complexity is often used as an instrument of camouflage, simplifying supports transpancency.

4 Understand how powerful it is not to have to be right.

If you have to be right, you put yourself in a hedged lane, but once you experience the power of not having to be right, you will feel like you are

walking across open fields, the perspective wide and your feet free to take any turn.

5 See the future as a picture puzzle.

Mix and match the information you have until you see the new picture.

#6 Don't get so far ahead of the parade that people don't know you're in it.

The sender has to stay within the range of the receiver.

7 Resistance to change falls if benefits are real.

You don't bend down unless something is worth picking up. When people resist change - change you think they ought to readily embrace - you have either failed to make benefits transparent or there are good reasons to resist.

#8 Things that we expect to happen always happen more slowly.

Expectations always travel at higher speeds. With inventions, we continually underestimate the time span required from idea to their full realization.

9 You don't get results by solving problems but by exploiting opportunities.

Opportunity seekers know the future with its changes delivers the opportunities. Problem solvers are necessarily dealing with yesterday.

10 Don't add unless you subtract.

Lao Tzu: "To attain knowledge, add things every day. To attain wisdom, remove things every day."

11 Don't forget the ecology of technology.

When a new technology is introduced, make it a rule to ask: What will be enhanced? What will be diminished? What will be replaced? What new opportunities does it present?
